#### Topics and Suggested Questions for National Day of Social Action Panel Discussion July 23, 2025

The following is a combination of what Freedom School parents said matters most to them and their community and the questions sent to guest panelists, in no particular order. Together, let's confirm these are topics (and suggested questions) that we want to ask panelists. Please volunteer to bring up a topic or ask questions during the panel discussion.

- 1. How will closing the U.S. Department of Education impact local schools?
- 2. **Equity in school funding.** Fighting for equitable school funding to ensure all schools, regardless of their geographic location or socioeconomic status, have the resources they need to succeed. How do budget cuts impact schools? How can we as parents help ensure educational systems are fair for all children?
- 3. **Arts and physical education.** Ensuring all students have opportunities to engage in music, arts, and physical education, as these programs foster creativity, critical thinking, and overall well-being.
- 4. **Teacher pay and working conditions.** Advocating for better compensation, professional development, and improved working conditions for teachers to retain high-quality educators and prevent burnout.
- 5. **Culturally responsive curriculum.** Ensuring that the curriculum reflects diverse histories, cultures, and perspectives, making learning more relevant and engaging for all students. How can parents help (positively) influence curriculum?
- 6. **School climate and teacher/student relationships.** Promoting policies and practices that foster positive relationships between teachers and students, building trust, and promoting a strong sense of community within the school.
- 7. Parent and family engagement in education. Strengthening the role of parents and families in the educational process through community outreach, parent-teacher organizations, and programs that encourage parental involvement in school activities. What are the top three areas parents can advocate for to support schools? What type of advocacy has the largest impact? Writing letters/emails to the editor? Writing letters/emails to elected officials (whether they represent us or not)? Lawful protests? Attending School Board meetings? Does joining the PTA really matter? Why? What are recommended strategies for working with administration at your child's school ("in the building")?
- 8. **School safety and anti-bullying.** Fostering a safe and supportive school environment free from bullying, harassment, and violence, with programs that address both physical and psychological safety.
- 9. **Restorative Justice practices.** Implementing restorative justice approaches to discipline that focuses on healing, accountability, and community-building rather than punitive measures, especially for marginalized students.
